

until 1942. It was unveiled by James Thorn, M.P. of Thames, supported by Edwin Edwards, Mayor of Paeroa and Mr W H Taylor, a keen local historian, who recognised that a man who had played such a part in New Zealand history should not be unacknowledged by the New Zealand Government and citizens of Paeroa. In 1868 James Mackay, as the Civil Commissioner at Thames, was shown gold samples from Karangahake. Opening of the area for prospecting/mining and settlement was strongly opposed by the lwi. James Mackay was instrumental in wearing down the resistance and forcing the lwi into an agreement – Deed of Cession (18.2.1875) that granted the Crown leasehold mining rights over 326,358 hectares. Ohinemuri was proclaimed a goldfield on 3 March 1875. Mackaytown was named after him. James Mackay was also the first President of the Paeroa A&P Association 1898 - 1902 and took an interest generally in the affairs of Paeroa. He died in 1912.
