

Dog Exercise Area



Whiritoa Beach

North of Moray Place Beach access

20 December to 9 February and all public holiday weekends:

- Dogs Prohibited 9am - 6pm
- Dogs off leash 6pm - 9am the following day

10 February to 19 December (excluding public holidays and weekends):

- Dogs on leash 10am - 3pm
- Dogs off leash 3pm - 10am the following day

South of Moray Place Beach access*

- Dogs prohibited all year round on the southern end of Whiritoa Beach, including the urupā site.

*These areas include significant NZ Dotterel breeding sites.

You can exercise your dog off the leash in the locations and times described, as long as they are under control. The owner, or responsible person over 16-years-old must have control of the dog and remain in the exercise area while the dog is running free.
