KARAEHE | GLASS BOTTLES AND JARS

Don't overfill your crate

YES



Glass bottles and jars

(clear, amber, blue and green glass only)



Lids off and rinse



Remove all lids and put in the rubbish bin. Rinse glass bottles and jars to reduce contamination and place in the blue crate.



Wrap it

Wrap broken glass/china in paper and place in your rubbish bin.

NO place items in rubbish bin

- broken glass, windows and mirrors
- china and crockery (cups, saucer, plates)
- drinking glasses
- fluorescent tubes and light bulbs
- glass bricks
- × vapeware
- opal glass (milky white)
- x pyrex dishes and oven ware
- × perfume bottles
- medical and laboratory glass containers

Make landfill your last choice

A circular waste economy means we keep resources in use for as long as possible. It's a big shift away from the wasteful 'take-make-dispose' system. Use the waste hierarchy for ideas to reduce, reuse, repair or repurpose stuff.

Refuse Transfer Stations

From 1 September 2023, the Waihī and Paeroa Refuse Transfer Stations will be managed and operated by Hauraki District Council.

Hours for both sites: **9am - 5pm, Wednesday - Sunday**, closed Mondays, Tuesdays and all public holidays.

Payment by Eftpos, debit and credit cards only. Official yellow pre-paid rubbish bags can be dropped off at no cost until 31 December 2023. After that, they will not be accepted.

The Waste Hierarchy Te Pūnaha Whakarōpū Para

Rethink/Redesign | Kia tukurua

Avoid unnecessary resource use and waste by designing waste out.

Refuse | Whakanau

Say no to stuff that's single use or wasteful.

Reduce | Whakakaiti

Buy less stuff you don't need.

Reuse | Whakamahi anō

Keep reusing it until it's broken.

Repair | Whakatika

Put stuff back into use by repairing it.

Repurpose | Whakarerekē

Create new jobs for old stuff.

Rot | Whakapopo

Compost all organic stuff e.g. dirty paper and food waste.

Recycle | Hangarua

When all else fails try recycling.

Dispose or burn | Porowhiu me te Tahu

Landfill, waste to energy, burning or burying.

PARA KAI | **FOOD SCRAPS**

If in doubt, leave it out. Put in your rubbish bin. Turning your food scraps into compost

Meat, fish, small bones and cooled fat



Egg shells and soft shells e.g. prawn shells



Bread, pastries, cakes and biscuits



Coffee grounds and tea leaves (not tea bags)



Fruit and vegetable stalks and peels



Rice, grains, cereals and noodles



Left overs and plate scrapings, spoiled food and dairy products



Place bin at kerbside with handle in the upright, locked position.

Para kai - Food scraps

Why do we need a food scraps bin?

When we started audits in 2021, they showed that 47 percent of waste going to landfill was food scraps.

Food scraps in landfill, as they break down, give off green-house gases like methane, which is not great for the environment. Getting food scraps out of landfill and collected to make compost is a much better use of the resource and gets the goodness back into the soil, where it belongs.

The new food scrap bins are funded by the Ministry for the Environment Manatū Mō Te Taiao.





What happens to my recycling collected at kerbside (recycling, glass and food scraps)?

Your food scraps will go to Living Earth at Tirohia Energy Park, just outside Paeroa, where it will be processed for composting.

Your glass and recycling will be taken by Waste Management to a MRF (Materials Recovery Facility).



Flattened cardboard boxes (remove leftover pizza from pizza boxes)



Lids off and rinse



Remove all lids and place in the rubbish bin. Rinse plastic containers to reduce contamination. Don't squash plastic containers or cans.

How does the pre-paid Pay As You Throw (PAYT) tag work for the rubbish bin?

The \$8.00 PAYT tag will replace the yellow pre-paid bags.

You'll need to attach a new tag to the rubbish bin each time it is put out for collection. Feed the tag through the handles on the lid.

The tags have a built in security feature, so they can't be copied. Falsifying a PAYT tag could result in a \$200 fine.

The tags will be available to purchase from our Council services centres in Ngātea, Paeroa and Waihī and from some supermarkets and dairies.


